





Advocacy

A wide range of activities

Not always about lobbying

Builds familiarity and trust with elected officials

Lobbying

Small, but essential part of advocacy

About the passage or defeat of specific legislation


Succeeds based on advocacy activities beforehand

Two rules

1. The most powerful advocacy contacts are made by constituents

Programs that demonstrate a grass-roots constituency get priority attention

Start at the beginning




 Volunteer in a candidate's campaign

 Get to know the candidates and their aides

 Contribute to the campaigns of candidates you support

Stand up at town meetings


Welcome the elected



 Congratulate newly elected officials

Offer yourself as a resource

 Connect your legislators with their constituents



 Contact your legislators when you are not asking for something

 Meet elected officials whenever you can

 Discover common interests and develop personal bonds

Initiate advocacy



 Ask a legislator to address your meeting

Make your arts event an advocacy event

 Recognize and thank legislators

 Extend a hand to your legislators

Expand your agenda





 Extend the arts to other public policy issues

 Pay attention to a legislator's interests

 Position the arts for problem-solving






