Revenue strategies reviewed in the brief include special taxes and fees, lottery and gaming taxes, specialty license plate sales, income tax checkoffs, and bond issues, as well as nonstate sources of funds. Sections on policy considerations and success factors are designed to help your agency navigate the pros and cons of these funding strategies.
