Louisiana Arts in Education Public Survey 2009

The survey was available online from May 28, 2009 to August 14, 2009. A link for the public survey was sent via email to state arts councils, neighborhood associations, statewide chambers of commerce, educators groups, library associations and parent and teacher organizations. A total of 513 respondents completed the survey. Respondents were asked to complete demographic information to facilitate an understanding of the participants in this survey. No individuals or organizations are identified by name in final reports or any publicly published outcomes and no names were shared with other organizations. The survey was commissioned by the Louisiana Department of Culture, Recreation and Tourism, Office of Cultural Development and conducted by KID smART, a nonprofit arts education organization based in New Orleans. The N in parentheses at the end of each question indicates the number of respondents for that question.

Results

Who replied

Respondents were predominantly educators and non-profit affiliates – administrators, staff, vendors or service providers to schools, cultural organizations and municipal or government groups. 29.8% were employed in other professions and 5.9% had retired from other professions. Respondents were well educated, with 84.7% having a Bachelor's degree or higher, and lived in predominantly urban and suburban areas around the state.

Familiarity with the arts.

Respondents were active arts patrons, attending a variety of cultural events and supporting cultural institutions. The majority of respondents (93%) knew someone who makes their living by creating and performing art. A large number of respondents (40%) received MOST of their exposure to the arts from **school**.

Arts in Education Information (general)

Respondents were almost unanimous in their feeling that the arts play an extremely important/important role in society and in a child's education. Eighty-two percent of the respondents have or have had at least one child living in the household currently in school. An large majority, 72%, of all respondents were not satisfied with the education offered in area public schools. These respondents overwhelmingly place a high value on arts education and felt that the arts are an integral part of a well rounded education. Additionally, respondent felt that the arts helped give students a variety of intangibles including creativity, self-expression, individualism, access to effective learning, tolerance and openness, support for troubled youth and self-confidence.







Arts in Education (local)

Respondents indicated a limited availability of arts in their local school districts; more than 71% of the respondents indicated there were limited, none or they were unsure of the arts education available in their community schools. The respondents also indicated that they were extremely supportive of more arts education in their schools.

What concerns might you have? (N=203)

The responses indicate a definite desire to see the current system undergo some changes. However, the most popular sentiment supported not the establishment of **all** schools as fully arts- integrated but rather the more moderate response of adding more visual and performing arts across the board to the existing curriculum. Some comments indicate the support is tempered by concerns of creating a further hierarchy in the schools; students in non-arts-integrated programs might be left behind in favor of the opportunities offered to those that were integrated. Additionally, because of the ever-present fear of budget cuts and the low priority of education, respondents voiced concern that the addition of art education will come at the expense of something else equally critical.
