
# **Advocating for Federal Arts Funding**

NASAA President and CEO Pam Breaux recently submitted <u>testimony on behalf of state arts</u> <u>agencies</u> to the U.S. House of Representatives Interior Appropriations Subcommittee (which has jurisdiction over the budget for the National Endowment for the Arts). Pam urged the subcommittee to increase funding for the agency in fiscal year 2022, underscoring the value of the federal-state partnership to communities across the country. She emphasized the tremendous work state arts agencies have accomplished in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic and shared new research on how the creative sector can benefit the broader economic recovery of the entire nation. NASAA is working in partnership with colleagues to <u>put forth arts-focused policy</u> as Congress develops an infrastructure investment plan and further recovery legislation.

# **Data on Your State's Creative Economy**

Updated <u>Creative Economy State Profiles</u> are now available, describing the value of arts and cultural production in every state prior to the global coronavirus pandemic. These data, published by the <u>U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis</u> (BEA) in partnership with the National Endowment for the Arts, are an authoritative source for the value of the creative economy in each state. The data show that the creative industries are an economic powerhouse that will be crucial to our nation's recovery. Our recent (36-minute) webinar offered a <u>demonstration of the Creative Economy State Profiles tool</u>, showing how you can use it and other resources from NASAA, the BEA and the Arts Endowment to advocate with legislators for public arts support in your state.
