

Arts Across the Prairie: Placemaking in Rural North Dakota

This statewide program is in collaboration with the North Dakota Department of Transportation, North Dakota Tourism, and the State Legislature.

The seven-year program has an approximate budget of \$5 million.

ARTS ACROSS THE PRAIRIE: PLACEMAKING IN RURAL NORTH DAKOTA

Arts Across the Prairie is a first-of-its-kind, statewide, public art program from NDCA. This program will create eight large-scale art installations — one for each geographic region in the state — that reflect the unique history, landscape, and cultural heritage of these regions.

All eight installations will be placed in rural locations. Rural = no buildings or people!

WHATIS PUBLIC ART?

Public Art is conceived for a particular place or community with the intention of being broadly accessible.

It can take a variety of forms, sizes, and scales. Additionally, the art can be temporary or permanent.






WHERE WE ARE: Region 4 - NE North Dakota

- Artist selected, initial site visit just took place













Concept proposals 'Sky B' and 'Esker C1' for Region 4 – "Endless Sky - Dynamic Layers" (final design yet to be determined)







- Potential sites for installation
 - Rural = no buildings or people!
 - Natural landscape based on cultural heritage
 - Located off a State Highway, best based on partnership with ND DOT
- Funding, partnerships, community engagement, and more!



What is a Stakeholder?

- Diverse individuals from across all counties
- Commit to ongoing (monthly) meetings over Zoom
- Facilitate site selection for proposed art installation
- Engage community members and leadership
- Assist in artist selection
- Celebrate regional cultural heritage and spread knowledge

ARTS A CROSS THE PRAIRIE GOALS



Arts Across the Prairie was developed to celebrate the cultural heritage of rural areas, foster creative relationships across counties and regions, bolster NDCA's role as a rural development partner, and spur economic development through tourism.

Furthermore, as a community-driven initiative, it aims to promote civic pride, affirm uniqueness of place, and strengthen cultural identity. This program will create public-private partnerships throughout the state and will provide a national model of this type of creative placekeeping.
